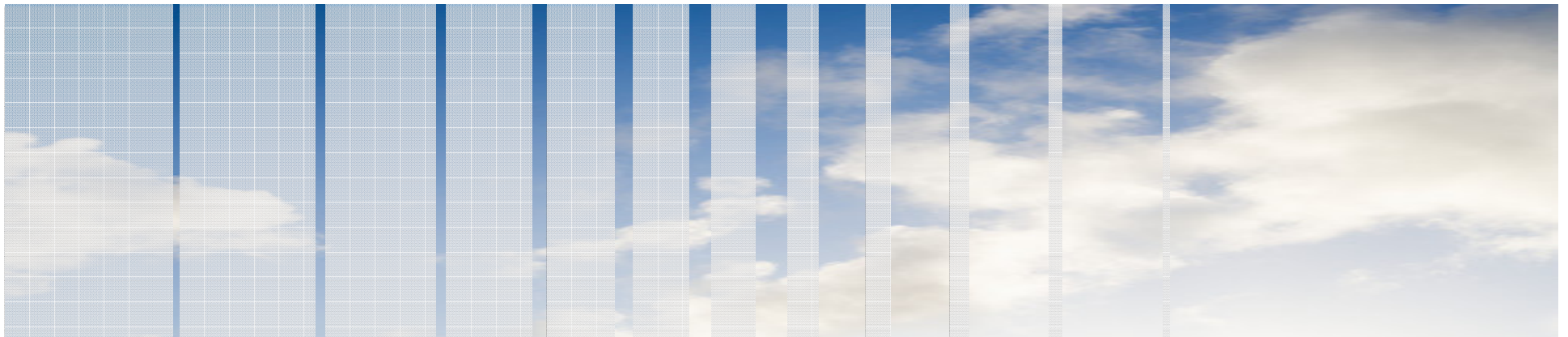

Objective of the workshop

 - Build on development policies
 - Can be implemented effectively
 - Include provisions for financial and technological assistance
 - Move the discussion beyond what is on the table
 - Are negotiable in the time till Copenhagen



Development first
